MUD AND SALTWATER FILM FEST MEGA CULTURAL ENVIRONMENTAL EVENT

The Film Fest's popularity has grown exponentially, with an audience over 800 at The Mangrove Hotel in August enjoying the 24 short films made by professional and emerging filmmakers about Roebuck Bay and the Kimberley coast. The Broome Bird Observatory's winning film about the mangrove crab migration will be screened to an audience of 8,000 at the Peninsula Film Fest in early 2018.

Aussie actor Steve Bastoni and Shayne Thomson provided free acting and filmmaking workshops in May and it paid off, with filmmakers making drama, science shorts, documentary and comedy using guerrilla filmmaking techniques. With the Film Fest so popular, the Film Fest is on in August 2018 at Sun Pictures, the world's oldest picture garden.

The appetite for the Mud and Saltwater Short Film Fest is stronger than ever, with rescreens at Cygnet Bay Pearl Farm, Broome Surf Club, Sun Pictures (Shinju Matsuri) and Derby! STUDENTS BRUSH WITH CELEBRITY

LIFE IN THE LONG MUD ON FILM

RBWG's latest film, <u>Life in the long mud</u> was premiered at the 2017 Mud and Saltwater Short Film Fest. With a major 'benthic' expedition on Roebuck Bay and Eighty Mile Beach in October 2016, RBWG provided a brief for Paul Bell to make a film about the amazing invertebrates in the Ramsar wetlands of Roebuck Bay and Eighty Mile Beach.

The film is impressive, with aerial footage of large

flocks of migratory shorebirds, macros of tiny invertebrates in the productive intertidal mudflats and close ups of the legs of volunteers disappearing into the soft warm mud.

The expedition team of 100, included scientists, Yawuru, Karajarri and Nyangumarta ranger groups, landowners and volunteers. The impetus for the expedition was to conduct repeat surveys of the benthic invertebrates to discover if and how benthos abundance, diversity and distribution has changed. The recommendations from the 2016 benthos expedition will inform management of these valuable wetlands for migratory shorebirds, as they come under increasing pressure from industrial developments on their staging grounds on the Yellow Sea in China.

STATE LIBRARY ARCHIVE WEBSITES

A proud achievement for the RBWG, with the State Library of WA requesting permission to archive the Roebuck Bay Working Group and Mud and Saltwater Short Film websites. PANDORA, Australia's Web Archive, was set up by the National Library of Australia in 1996 to enable the archiving and provision of long-term access to online Australian publications. TEAMWORK HELPS ENVIRONMENT, COMMUNITY AND BAY

State NRM has funded a collaborative project to improve the McMahon walkway in Cable Beach. The Shire repaired footpaths, weeded and cleaned up the walkway and stormwater drain - which had become a dumping ditch for garden waste and litter.

Shire and Yawuru Rangers helped hundreds of students plant a bushtucker trail and endemic plants in the drain to absorb/slow nutrient flow into Roebuck Bay. RBWG produced the short film **Bushtuckers healing community and bay** and delivered fridge magnets to residents in the area with



tips to keep the stormwater drain and walkway clean into the future.

DON'T BAG BROOME

RBWG wrote to the State Government in March 2017 to urge for a Container Deposit Scheme (10 cents back on drink containers) and Ban on Single Use Plastic Bags in Broome. The Environment Minister replied "it is anticipated a container deposit scheme will commence from January 1, 2019." More good news (12/9/2017): Premier Mark McGowan announced WA will ban single-use plastic bags from July 1 2018. Plastics remain in the environment, breaking up into smaller and smaller pieces which contaminate soil and water, and have serious impacts



on the health of wildlife, who can mistakenly ingest plastics. The solution is to prevent plastic pollution in the first place, by changing our laws and our habits in WA.

DRAIN STENCILLING PROJECT

Can you believe it, 60 people painted azure Keep Our Bay Clean stencils on Broome's footpaths! Bart Pigram said, "It's simple... Look after the country and the country will look after you! An old saying extremely relevant to today's environmental threats. Walyjalajala buru jayida!" Media stories, posters and a short film on social media, are being circulated to remind everyone to keep rubbish and nutrients out of drains and Coastal Garden» This is simply, growing native plants, mulching heavily and trapping rainwater using swales to reduce nutrient



enriched runoff entering Roebuck Bay and feeding toxic blooms of Lyngbya.

WORK TO REDUCE NUTRIENTS ENTERING ROEBUCK BAY

RBWG have been lobbying Water Corporation, the State and Department of Environment Regulation to investigate and reduce nutrient seepage from Broome South Wastewater Treatment Plant. The response has been encouraging, with a scope of works undertaken at BS WWTP to reduce the likelihood of nutrients entering Roebuck Bay:

- -Lined seeping holding pond/disused seeping holding ponds
- -Holding tanks replace Shire storage pond at Golf Course.
- -Nutrient Irrigation Plan regulating Golf Course watering.
- -Monitoring bores (18) at BSWWTP, Golf Course, shoreline. Broome Wastewater Management/Broome North WWTP upgrade (Sep 17 – Feb 18). The works include:
- -Wastewater pipeline (3.3km) to divert flows from BSWWTP.
- -Wastewater pump station upgrade.
- -Second pivot irrigation system at BNWWTP for future flows.

 Note: RBWG continues to urge for the tertiary and secondary ponds at BS WWTP to be lined, with worsening blooms of Lyngbya in Roebuck Bay downgradient of the plant.

LETTERS OF SUPPORT SUCCESS

RBWG has written six letters of support for partner grants, with great outcomes. "We had success in the Shire 'Community Sponsor Program' and RBWG's excellent letter was an important factor in the application success. - Write an individual letter for the organisation submitting the grant.
- Demonstrate how strategic priorities of sponsor, RBWG and grant align.
- Include how both organisations will work together to help enviro i.e. Ramsar.
- Use official letterhead, signature of Chair, one pager on your organisation.

RAMSAR WETLANDS AND HELICOPTERS

To protect migratory shorebird roosts from disturbance by helicopters flying in/out of Broome Airport, RBWG asked Air Services Australia for a stakeholder meeting (Jun) to raise awareness and seek solutions. Outcomes thus far:

- Parks and Attractions/Air Services update fly neighbourly policy for ERSA (promulgation to be verified Nov 2017) resulting in Ramsar site visible to aircraft operators/rotary aircraft to operate above 1000 ft.




- In interim, helicopter operators move low level training north of Broome and pilots reminded at weekly meetings to avoid Ramsar site/operate above 1000ft/closer to 2000ft.
- Anecdotal reports suggest a decrease in larger helicopters flying over the Ramsar site, but some smaller helicopters are still seen.

GRANT SUCCESS

RBWG is in a sound financial position with five grants:

- -State NRM Community Capability Grant Large (Aug 16-Dec 18).
- 'Improved understandings and management of Ramsar values through innovative media, science, culture, governance'.
- -State NRM Community Action Grant (Apr 17-Dec 18) 'Bushtuckers, native plantings and community reinventing drains, walkways and pride'.
- -Inspiring Australia (Jul 17-Jun 18): 'Science on Broome Coast'.
- -Derby West Kimberley Quick Grant Mud and Saltwater Film Fest screening in Derby.
