Our qualified team of horticulturalists ensures irrigation of the golf course is within the parameters of our nutrient irrigation management plan, which provides a guideline for using recycled water in a way that does not adversely impact the environment.

We are also careful not to over-water because it is detrimental to the health of our turf

Since the Broome North wastewater treatment plant came online in 2012, we have reduced irrigation volumes at the club by 50 per cent and also planted 400 native trees to help with nutrient uptake.


There are many known contributors to nutrients in Roebuck Bay, such as storm water runoff, town drainage and farming, so investigations are needed to determine the best course of future action.

The Broome Golf Club is an essential public amenity that is enjoyed by many members of our community and tourists alike.

Without treated wastewater we would need to use expensive drinking water to irrigate our greens, which is economically and environmentally unsustainable.
