Crime spikes over holidays

More than 50 burglary and stealing offences were reported to Broome police on the recent long weekend and school holidays.

Officer-in-charge Senior Sergeant Brendon Barwick said 30 burglaries took place from September 26-October 9, most of them in the last week of the school break.

Sixteen of those incidents were

as a result of unlocked doors and windows, while 12 were forced entries and four were attempted burglaries.

Police reported 23 stealing offences, 12 from vehicles broken into, six from unlocked vehicles and five from residences with valuables left outside on tables and chairs.

Sen Sgt Barwick said since the arrest and remand of a "high risk

offender" in the last weekend of the holidays, the instances of burglary, stealing of motor vehicles and general stealing had declined.

Residents have been warned to stay vigilant in the wet season and to ensure their homes are secure and their valuables out of view.

"With the wet season commencing, not everyone has the capacity to have or run an air-conditioner so doors and windows are left open to

get whatever airflow is available he said.

"There are people who will tal advantage of this and see it as a open invitation to commit offen es."

Police also targeted road users i the school holidays and carried or 1639 random breath tests.

One motorist was found to be over 0.05 per cent while anothe tested over 0.08 per cent.

Mating sea snakes make a fishing tour guide's day
