Movie night on mudflats

A free community slide show and
movie night documenting young-
sters and international scientists
exploring the fascinating world of
mudflats will be held in Broome
this Friday.

The event, hosted by the Yawuru
Parks and Wildlife Joint Manage-
ment Team and the Roebuck Bay
Working Group, follows the
Department of Parks and Wild-
life's recent school holiday pro-
gram, Jabarbarl Warlidany (Mud-
flat Hunter).

Participants embarked on an
excursion with rangers from the
Yawuru Parks and Wildlife joint
management team and interna-
tional scientists who visited Roe-
buck Bay to conduct a survey of
creatures inhabiting the mudflats.

As well as looking at the crea-
tures under the microscope, par-
ticipants heard cultural stories
and learnt about bush tucker from
the rangers and guest Dianne
Appleby, and drew their observa-
tions with visiting artist Angela
Rossen.
