Russian bird on first visit

A rare Russian songbird has caused a flap in the Australian bird-watching community after making a surprise visit to Broome.

The tiny Kamchatka leaf warbler was found at Broome Bird Observatory by wardens Wardens Nigel and Jaime Jackett on Valentine's Day.

Mr Jackett said the visit was an exciting discovery because it marked the first time a Kamchatka leaf warbler had been seen in the country.

"The closest it's been seen is Ashmore reef which is technically Australia, but it's never been seen on the mainland of Australia."

Mr Jackett said he was first

alerted to the unexpected guest when he was inside the warden's cottage and heard an unusual birdcall from outside.

"I didn't know what it was when it was calling, I just knew it was different," he said.

"When I saw it, I instantly knew it was a type of leaf warbler ... so I ran back in the house and got my camera and iPhone, and was able to take some photos and record its song which you need to figure out what it is exactly. The leaf warblers are such a tricky group of songbirds that they often can't be identified to a particular species by appearances alone — it is their melodious voices that separate them."

The song was analysed and compared to various songs of

leaf warblers from Asia before it was identified as a Kamchatka species.

Mr Jackett said leaf warblers were generally long-distance migrants, with the Kamchatka species breeding in far eastern Russia, and migrating as far south as Indonesia. He said the visitor would have flown 9000km to reach the Kimberley and said it may have been because its usual island destination was unsuitable. The warden said the bird, nicknamed Chuck, had attention from bird watchers Australia-wide.

Wise Earth Syndicate. Wise Earth director Garry Baverstock said the retreat would cater for a niche market for people from the international and Australian markets seeking to relax and restore their health in unique surroundings.

"We are planning yoga and personal programs as well as education on nutrition," he said.

"Part of that will include the beautiful stretch of coastline between Cable Beach and Coconut Well." Mr Baverstock said the aim was to create a "low-key" experience that would allow guests to enjoy restaurants, bars and other tourism facilities that already exist in Broome.

The proposed site was bordered to the west by the Yawu-

ru Conservation Estate and unallocated crown land, creating a natural bush boundary.
